Ashland High Students Unite to Clothe the Homeless

The Ashland High School club, Breaking the Barriers (BTB), partnered this holiday season with nonprofits, Hammer & Chisel, an Ashland-based group that provided admin support, and Net of Compassion, a Worcester group that provided the site for a street store. The groups opened a street store, which served hundreds of people in need of clothing and personal care products in downtown Worcester.

"The street store is a pop-up clothing shop for the homeless where they are served with dignity and respect, instead of receiving handouts that might not fit correctly or they might not like," Neha Shabeer, BTB co-president and a founder, said. "On Saturday, December 15, 25 BTB student volunteers spent the day acting as shopping assistants guiding homeless through the shop, helping them find what they were looking for, and showing care by listening to their stories."

"It was a day filled with joy felt by both students and the homeless we served," Shabeer added. "BTB collected over 200 bags of clothing, shoes, blankets, new feminine products and new



socks/underwear with a monthlong clothing drive at Ashland High School, town hall and Faith Community Church. Our effort was also supported by the Ashland Cub Scouts and MetroWest Youth Teaming Together. The Ashland community truly united in this effort!"

BTB was founded in May 2016 by Ashland high students Neha Shabeer, Haley Boccuzzi, Stephanie Moscaritolo, Selma Chamime, Annabelle Rutherford and Elizabeth Cahill. The community service and leadership club follows the motto, "be the change you wish to see in the world." BTB has had success pearheading the school's first international service trip to Cape

Town, South Africa, in February 2018, a leadership program for rising middle-schoolers, and a shadowing program for high schoolers.

BTB has been inspiring youth to serve the community by participating in an Intergenerational leadership team, volunteering at soup kitchens, planning regional substance abuse prevention events part of MetroWest Youth Teaming Together, attending the National Youth Leadership Institute training at the Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) conference in Washington, D.C., leading Hammer & Chisel's Strike Action Network, and assisting their partner, Decisions at Every Turn Coalition.



"We are a club interested in spreading our message to all aspects of the high school community, by actively working to make partnerships with other clubs and sports teams. We strive to be a blend of leaders from the Ashland High School community," Shabeer said.
